

《台灣原住民族研究》徵稿啟事

《台灣原住民族研究》為國立東華大學原住民族學院出版之學術期刊，凡內容有關原住民族各領域之學術性研究論文，均歡迎賜稿。

一、文稿類型

- (一) 專題論文 (theme article)：由本刊編輯委員會根據特定議題，邀請作者撰文投稿，篇幅一萬六千字至二萬字左右。
- (二) 研究論文 (research article)：未在國內其他學術期刊發表過之學術論文，篇幅如一般專題論文，篇幅一萬六千字至二萬字左右。
- (三) 政策論壇 (policy forum)：根據特定政策，邀請學者、或是參與者所作的專業意見，篇幅一萬字左右。
- (四) 研究紀要 (research reflection & notes)：研究紀錄、觀察與心得，篇幅一萬字左右。
- (五) 書評 (book review)：相關領域書籍之介紹與評論，篇幅三千字以內。

二、論文格式

- (一) 本刊接受華文、英文文稿，撰寫格式請參考[本刊撰稿格式](#)。
- (二) 稿件請以電子檔 (word) 製作，橫向書寫，來稿請附上 word、pdf 檔。
- (三) 論文文稿應含篇名、作者、服務機構及職稱、華文摘要 (五百字以內)、關鍵詞、本文、參考文獻、(附錄)、英文摘要 (含文章篇名、作者姓名、服務機構及職稱、摘要 150 字以內、關鍵詞)。

三、審查程序

來稿經本刊編輯室初步確認撰稿格式後，將聘請至少二位專家進行雙盲審查。最後是否收錄刊登由編輯委員會議決定。本刊編輯委員會對來稿有權做必要之潤飾。來稿恕不退還，敬請自行留底。若論文已經在其他期刊進行審查，敬請告知。所有稿件，將於收稿後三個月內奉覆採用與否。

四、校稿程序

通過審查並完成修改的稿件，請提供修正版電子檔（word、pdf）一份，以方便排版作業。排版後文稿將寄交作者校對，校稿需於收到後一週內寄回本刊編輯室；逾時的文稿，本刊保留拒絕刊登的權利。

五、版權事宜

- （一）本刊不接受已於其他學術期刊出版的文稿。
- （二）已接受刊登之來稿，作者須簽署「著作授權讓與書」交予本期刊，版權歸本期刊所有，本刊保有另外出刊之權利，但作者仍保有著作人格權以及未來自行集結出版或教學等個人使用之權利，但須註明本刊出處。
- （三）經審查通過刊登者，本刊將贈送作者當期期刊二本及抽印本十本，不另致稿酬。

六、出刊日期

本刊預定每年出版兩期（六月、十二月），歡迎隨時來稿。

Taiwan Journal of Indigenous Studies *Editorial Notes, Call for Manuscripts, and Submission Guidelines*

The *Taiwan Journal of Indigenous Studies (TJIS)* has been established to provide a forum for intellectual discourse on Indigenous Studies development and policy implementation as it affects the lives of people in Taiwan as well as in other parts of the world. It is an initiative of the faculty at the College of Indigenous Studies (CIS), National Dong Hwa University (NDHU) and a group of indigenous professionals seeking to provide opportunities for a diverse audience to access the perspectives of a wide range of authors. *TJIS* accepts manuscripts in either Mandarin Chinese or English, and publishes semiannual with funding from the Council of Indigenous Peoples, Taiwan.

Manuscripts to be considered for publication should be sent to tjis.cis.ndhu@gms.ndhu.edu.tw (The Editor of *Taiwan Journal of Indigenous Studies*).

TJIS is a transdisciplinary publication consisting of scholarly articles, commentary, reviews, literature, and original scholarly papers on a wide range of issues in the fields of history, anthropology, geography, sociology, political science, health, literature, law, education, and the arts. The submission of material for consideration as a theme article, a research article, a policy forum, a research reflection & notes, or a book review is welcomed by the editorial board. Manuscripts must be original and not currently under review elsewhere. Theme articles and research articles should normally be within 10,000-15,000 words, including all notes and references. Research reflection & notes and policy forums & review should normally be within 2,000-5,000 words. An abstract of up to 150 words must precede the main text, and all pages should be numbered. Two hard copies should be submitted to 'The Editor' at the address given above, and one copy retained by the author. At the same time, an electronic copy (which must match the hard copy exactly) should be emailed as an attachment in Word or RTF to: tjis.cis.ndhu@gms.ndhu.edu.tw. Resubmissions following a 'revise and resubmit' verdict on the original submission must follow the same procedure.

The title page should contain the full title, subtitle (optional), preferred abbreviated running head, abstract (100–150 words), and key words (no more than 5) in alphabetical order for searching online. A short biographical note (50–100 words) should accompany the manuscript, giving the author's name, current affiliation, e-mail address, telephone

and fax number, research interests, and recent publications. Because each manuscript will be sent out for anonymous review, the enclosed biographical note and cover sheet should not be attached to the manuscript. For this reason, a second title page should also be included, containing only the title of the manuscript. All possible identifying information should also be excluded from the body of the text.

Tables and Figures/Illustrations. Each table must be typed out on a separate sheet, and not included as part of the text. The table titles should be collected in a single list and typed out on a separate sheet.

Each figure/illustration should be on a separate sheet and not included as part of the text. The figure/illustration captions should be collected on a single list and typed out on a separate sheet.

Tables and figures/illustrations should be numbered with Arabic numerals. The approximate position of each table and figure/illustration should be indicated in the manuscript. Captions should include keys to symbols.

Figures. Artwork must be submitted in suitable condition for publication.

Notes and References. Footnotes to the text should be avoided wherever this is reasonably possible. Essential notes should be indicated by superscript numbers in the text and presented at the bottom of each page, not at the end of the text. Footnotes should not be used for citing references.

References cited in the text should read as follows: Brown (1975: 63–4), (Brown and Smith, 1975: 198). Use ‘et al.’ when citing a work by more than two authors, e.g. Brown et al. (1981) or (Brown et al., 1981). The letters a, b, c, etc. should be used to distinguish citations of different works by the same author in the same year, e.g. Brown (1975a, b).

In the reference list, titles of journals should not be abbreviated. All references cited in the text should be listed alphabetically and presented in full, as in the following examples:

Proofs. Proofs will be sent to authors if there is sufficient time to do so. They should be corrected and returned to the publisher within 10 days. Major alterations to the text cannot be accepted. The editor reserves the right not to accept articles for consideration if they are not presented in the house style or not of the appropriate length.

Other notes. Rejected manuscripts will not normally be returned unless a self-addressed envelope and international postage have been sent to the editor. Books for review should be directed to 'The Editor' at the address or email given above.
